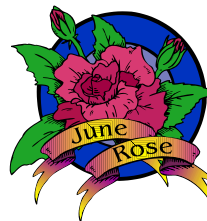






The doors on the bathrooms are now fully automatic. We hope this is a big improvement for those who struggle with opening these doors.

Cancellation Policy: All trips are non-refundable unless a replacement is secured.

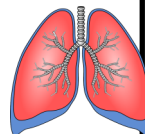

I haven't written much in the last few months because I didn't have any pressing news that I just needed to share with you. BUT, I'm going to take a moment to do something I rarely do.....brag. Reins of Life

Therapeutic Horseback Riding

NEEDS Volunteers! Especially horse feeders

Reins of Life is a therapeutic horseback riding facility for children and adults with disabilities. They are located at 9375 W 300 N in Michigan City. They have 13 equines on the property, including a miniature Mediterranean donkey.



Since they are a not-for-profit organization, volunteers are a necessary and precious commodity. **THEY ESPECIALLY NEED PEOPLE TO VOLUNTEER DURING THE DAY** when so many are at work or school. Volunteer opportunities include:

- ♦ Feeding—Horses need to be fed twice per day.
- ♦ Sidewalker—Assures that the rider is safe, supports and helps the rider stay focused, and assists with reigning, etc.
- ♦ Leader—The horse leader concentrates on the horse, following the directions of the instructor and leading the horse if the rider is not able to “steer” the horse properly.
